# Survivors, One of Our Many Great MBA Qualities

ne of the most inspiring stories of survival is of Sir Ernest Shackleton's 1914-1916 Antarctic expedition. For 10 months, their ship was stuck in and then crushed by ice, forcing the crew to abandon it. Stranded with only three small lifeboats, a couple tents, and some supplies, Shackleton led his crew across ice floes for five months, finally reaching Elephant Island via lifeboats, where the group lived on seal meat and blubber. Shackleton and five crewmates took 16 days to cross 800 miles of treacherous open-ocean to the uncharted South Georgia island. He and two others hiked for 36 hours to find a whaling station. Four months later, he returned to the crew on Elephant Island to bring them home. How did the entire crew survive? Endurance, perseverance, adaptability, mental positivity, and the motivation to press on.

As the challenging year of 2020 draws to a close and I reflect on everything we all have endured in our personal lives, in our communities, our country, and our world, the word "survivor" come to mind. That word means something different to every individual, often being attached to beating cancer or any other life-threatening illness, or living through a violent event or sudden loss. Upon reflection,

anyone who has experienced tragedy or stress in their life knows what it means to be a survivor.

The National Crime Victim Law Institute defines a survivor as, "a person who endures adversity, moves through it, and perseveres; a person with resiliency who remains undefeated." This definition beautifully describes the characteristics of a survivor: *endurance*, *perseverance*, and *resilience*. Add to that, *adaptable*, *positive*, and *motivated to press on* and you have the true mindset of a survivor.

Normally, these characteristics apply to people, but I believe they also apply to institutions if they are to succeed and survive adversity. Throughout MBA's 70-year history, world events like the Vietnam and Iraq Wars, the stock market crashes of 1987 and 2008, diseases like polio and swine flu, and local disasters like the 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake and several campus fires, all could have led to MBA's closure. Yet, through all this, MBA has continued to grow and prosper. How? The short answer is: God-inspired people, from dedicated staff to devoted alumni and friends. We have endured, persevered, adapted, and worked untiringly to continue the mission and purpose Elder Grunke envisioned many years ago. The MBA spirit has rallied time and time again, but more importantly, we continue to place our trust and confidence in God to see us through. We are survivors because of His grace!

One of my favorite promises in the Bible is Isaiah 46:4 (NIV): *I am He, I have made you. I will carry you. I will sustain you. I will rescue you.*When your life is hit with difficulties and hardships, how do you respond? Do you feel helpless or overwhelmed? Does the mountain you have to climb look so steep that you give up? My prayer is that each of you will claim the promise that God will carry you and rescue you; that He will give you the needed strength to endure, to survive, and to press on.

# **BRING THEM HOME CAMPAIGN SUCCESS**

he March 31 session with student Greg Arnold\* and his MBA academic tutor, Linda Schaffner, was the beginning day of online education for our students. The unprecedented times COVID-19 has placed on all of us led to our MBA teachers working tirelessly online and on the phone to provide not only the academics, but the nurturing and connection our students were accustomed to and yearning for. Two weeks of temporary online education turned into four weeks, then six weeks, and by the end of April 2020, we realized it was our new normal for the remainder of the 2019–2020 school year.

According to a national poll reported by Statista.com, an estimated 43% of families in America had at least one parent who either lost a job, or had their wages reduced as a result of COVID-19. The daily news seemed to verify that number, and we quickly realized that a number of our MBA parents were part of that startling percentage. As the MBA administration looked forward to graduation for the Class of 2020, we

estimated that 28 of the 40 MBA seniors had parents who had been financially affected by COVID-19. We also realized that bringing our students back in the fall would present challenges as well.

Throughout our seven decades, there has been one constant that is as unseen to the eye as the COVID-19 pandemic sweeping our world: The MBA Spirit "with all of its might." While COVID-19 is a new challenge, MBA has survived other crises: the swine flu, regular flu quarantines in the dormitories, fires, national economic plummets, the 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake, and more.

How did we overcome these challenges? The MBA Spirit rallied around this campus and supported us financially, with materials, with volunteer labor, with hard work, and with prayers. So, once again, we asked the MBA Spirit "with all of its might" to rally around our Class of 2020, as well as our other students, and help us bring them back to their home on the shore. After all, you are the very backbone

of MBA, *you* are the MBA Spirit that rallies, and *you* came through.

In just less than three months, we exceeded our \$93,000 goal to help the Class of 2020 graduate debt-free from MBA by raising \$103,545. In June, we shifted our focus to bringing students back in the fall. By August 15, with several generous financial aid gifts from the Central California Conference as well as from other organizations, an additional \$176,000 was raised. Even though we were unable to bring our students back for in-person learning during the first semester, they came home this fall to the online program—and for many students, it was made possible by your financial support.

Thank you so much for your generosity, your support, and your positive can-do attitude. Thank you for standing in the gap, and for partnering with us as we continue to train and educate young people. You are a remarkable group of alumni and friends, and we could not have done this without you.

# FROM THE PRINCIPAL



# Adapt—By the Day or For a Lifetime

hirty-two years ago, I experienced a life lesson that I never imagined would be so important and necessary in helping me deal with the challenges I have faced during the 2020 school year.

In May 1987, I was finishing my freshman year at Union College in Lincoln, NE, and I knew I was ready for a different style of education. I had planned to go with my close friend and fellow theology student, Byard Parks, to Nazareth, Israel, for the year. Unfortunately, right around Christmas the General Conference closed all "calls" to the Middle East, so I headed to the Campus Ministries office and looked through the "call book." Adventist colleges and universities offered, and continue to offer, experiences that take you out of your

comfort zone through the Student Missions (SM) program. I found my "call" and decided to go to Japan during my junior year. On a humorous note, being a person who does not care for rice, I should have thought that choice through a little more.

During spring semester of 1988, I attended an evening class with all the other SM students who were planning to go abroad. One particular evening, senior student, Mark Learned, was the guest speaker. Mark was someone I looked up to, and was from my home town of Minnetonka, MN. He had just returned from serving as a SM in Japan and as he spoke that night, he said something that has stuck with me. "The most important thing to remember as you go out in service," Mark said, "is to be adaptable!" What a concept!

Upon my arrival in Japan, the first challenge I faced was that rice was served at every meal... even breakfast. I had to adapt! Door frames were shorter in Japan and being 6-foot 2-inches tall, I had to adapt and stoop at most doorways. Being in a place where I knew no one, I had to adapt!

My first Sabbath in Japan, our SM group went to Minoo Falls. After the Sabbath services, our assignment was to spend time alone and then make it back to Osaka by using the unfamiliar train system. Feeling extremely lonely, lost, and even a little scared, I went to Shinto Shrine Park to spend my alone time and read my Bible. I prayed a silent prayer for help, and in that moment, was reminded of that word—adapt. As I had aimlessly opened my Bible, I looked down onto the words of Isaiah 41:10 (NKJV)—

'Fear not, for I <u>am</u> with you; Be not dismayed, for I <u>am</u> your God. I will strengthen you, Yes, I will help you, I will uphold you with My righteous right hand.'

For 32 years, this verse has been a constant companion, but never as much as it has been during 2020, where every day has brought new challenges and obstacles. Navigating through these uncertain times, along with my colleagues, neighbors, students, parents, and alumni, has been one of the most difficult experiences in my professional life. At every turn, what appeared to be a good plan, had to be changed moments before implementation. In every area of life—in our homes, schools, communities, and world—we all have had to adapt. I don't know what future problems or difficulties will require my attention. However, I do know whose Hand I am holding on to and I am not afraid or anxious. I love the Billy Graham quote, "I have read all the way to the last page of the Bible, and it is all going to turn out alright."

MBA family, God has promised to give us the strength to adapt to whatever challenges we are faced with and He will give us the courage to press on!

# State of the School

> WHY? BECAUSE WE CONSIDER YOU VALUED FAMILY AND INVESTORS TO OUR MISSION AND OUR VISION.

Due to COVID-19, we anticipated a significant drop in enrollment for the 2020–2021 school year. To adapt our budget to that forthcoming reality:

- MBA made \$1.532 million in reductions to counter the resulting \$1.7 million deficit (addressed below).
- Student enrollment fell from 211 last year to 142 students currently. We are grateful for each and everyone of those students.
   A majority of international students cannot return due to various countries' travel restrictions.
- Students are conducting online distance learning from their own homes, while MBA teachers remain on campus.

Santa Cruz County COVID-19 restrictions have prevented in-person learning until second semester, according to information available at the time of publication.

In anticipation of a January reopening, dormitory and cafeteria staff remain employed. What are those employees doing with no students on campus? As a result of your generous capital improvement donations, we now have extra hands to help execute those improvements.

- 80% are replacing carpet, painting, and landscaping the campus.
- 20% are temporarily replacing student labor, helping as teacher assistants, office staff, and assisting at-risk students who need additional tutoring and mentorship with online learning.

# "WHAT ABOUT THE \$168,000 BUDGET DEFICIT? IF YOU ADAPTED THE BUDGET, WHY THE SHORTFALL?"

The short answer: the unexpected fire of Beach Auditorium in July. The required Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) testing of the building's remains indicated noteable levels of lead that mandate a specific disposal method—specialized encapsulation—then shipment to an authorized site in Nevada to be buried where underground water levels will not be contaminated, and must be completed in a short and strict timeline. Intial budgeting allotted \$150,000 for the process, but MBA was later told the cost would be \$300,000—thus the shortfall.

# "WASN'T BEACH AUDITORIUM INSURED? DID YOU RECEIVE INSURANCE PAYMENTS TO HELP WITH THE DISPOSAL?"

Many have asked, but the answer is "no," on both counts. Our campus facilities are self-insured by Adventist Risk Management, which determined a while back that the building was not insurable.

The good news—the concrete foundation was undamaged. In Santa Cruz County terms, this allows that building's "footprint" to be retained and reused at that site. The possibilities are numerous, such as an outdoor amphitheater.

Our last note in this update is to acknowledge and thank the Central California Conference for their offer to loan \$500,000 to assist MBA in these difficult times. We greatly appreciate their desire to help us continue God's purpose for His beautiful campus. It is our prayer that we will not need to accept that offer if we can meet the \$168,000 shortfall. Stewardship is a priority; we do not want to borrow money! That's the bottom line. With God's blessing, we have adapted and are able to move forward despite the financial challenges that COVID-19 has thrown our way. We are close to being debt free, and we are determined to meet the challenge before us.



### MBA Loses a Piece of History to Fire


At approximately 9:45 pm Saturday evening, MBA's Beach Auditorium caught fire and was lost to the flames. The fire was contained to only Beach Auditorium and all other buildings were untouched. There were no injuries and everyone on campus is safe. We do not know the cause of the fire, but we are very blessed that no one was harmed and the fire was contained.

The building was the original auditorium from the wwii Camp McQuaide and was used for decades in the early years of MBA. It's a sad historical loss to the MBA campus and we ask for your prayers as we face the cleanup project.



For many of us, Beach Auditorium was more than just another building on campus. It was a place where many wonderful and fond memories were made, as was evident by the many comments that were shared on MBA's social media accounts. It was the place where talent shows, fall and spring concerts, Christmas programs, movie nights, Alumni Weekend events, and graduation ceremonies took place. A Santa Cruz Symphony performance, and a Miss Santa Cruz County beauty pageant were held in the auditorium one year when the Santa Cruz Civic Auditorium was under construction. After 1987, it was no longer used for events, but remained a landmark on campus and a place many alumni reminisced about.

To give you a brief history of this building, Beach Auditorium was considered a historic

site. It was originally named the Pacific Amphitheater and was built by the military sometime between 1938 and 1942 on the grounds of Camp McQuaide. It served as the theater and place of entertainment for the 1,900 officers and enlisted men of the 250th Coast Artillery Regiment who were based there. In 1943, after the threat of a coastal invasion significantly diminished, the camp became the housing facility for US Army prisoners and guards until it was closed in April of 1947. Pacific Amphitheater continued to be a venue for entertainment, even for the prisoners. It is rumored that famous entertainers once performed in the Pacific Amphitheater for the military personnel. After Camp McQuaide closed, the War Assets Administration assumed accountability for the property until it was awarded, at no cost, to Central California Conference of Seventh-day Adventist on August 13, 1948 and the property converted to Monterey Bay Academy.

Many have asked about the status of the investigation of the Beach Auditorium fire. According to the official report that MBA recently received from CalFire, the cause of the fire is inconclusive as the building was so completely burned the investigators were unable to determine a starting point of the fire or any evidence of what caused it. It is important to mention that there was no electricity or gas going to the building, nor was the building insured. Four years ago, Adventist Risk Management,

the insurance company for the Central California Conference (and MBA), refused coverage on the building due to the age and state of deterioration. Therefore, there is no insurance to collect and as a result, no plans at this time to rebuild. However, we will maintain the footprint of the site with the possibility of using the foundation as an outdoor amphitheater area for the students.

The loss of the Beach Auditorium is, without a doubt, a very sad event for MBA. A lot of history for both MBA and the military was destroyed when it burned. While we cannot afford to replace the building, and as devastating as it is to lose this landmark on campus, We are constantly reminded that this world is not our home, we are just passing through, but we will always treasure the sweet memories and good times we shared together in that grand building. SS


