2020 ALUMS OF THE YEAR

Hubert Cisneros '70 Alumnus of the Year

Hubert Cisneros grew up in Boulder, CO, where he came from a large family with deep Seventhday Adventist roots. He has a compelling testimony as a youth that brought him to Monterey Bay Academy where he graduated with the Class of 1970. Following his graduation, Hubert attended La Sierra University and Pacific Union College where he earned a bachelor of arts degree in theology. While still in college, he met and married, Lucy, the love of his life. His work in ministry also began while still in college, spending his summers serving as boy's director at Camp Wawona and Camp Yavapines.

Hubert has served the Adventist church in a variety of ways in multiple locations across the United States. He started his ministry in Arizona, where he served for seven years, pastoring several churches, including the local Adventist academy. In 1982, he moved to Oklahoma, where he pastored for six years, then returned to Arizona for an additional 11 years, serving in the Arizona Conference Office in a variety of positions, including ministerial director, youth director, and health and temperance director.

In 1999, Hubert and Lucy found themselves making a move to Ohio, where Hubert served in the Ohio Conference as the executive secretary and leader of church ministries, evangelism and Hispanic ministries. Eleven years later, in 2010, one more move was made to Nebraska, where Hubert served as youth and church ministries director for the Mid-American Union Conference. While serving in this capacity, he guided ministries for children, family, and Native Americans, as well as coordinated activities for Pathfinders, senior youth, young adults, Hispanic ministries, and global evangelism.

In 2018, Hubert retired, but *retirement* is a relative term as Hubert continued to pastor a threechurch district in southeastern Nebraska. Today, he is still serving his community fulltime, even in retirement, bringing his years of ministry service to 45 and counting.

Throughout his years of ministry service, Hubert has had a love for writing, having authored training manuals for small group evangelism, as well as co-authored a 5-volume set of books on how to do youth ministry on the local level. He also has a deep love for music, dedicating his musical talents to God early in his life. Hubert has also been a strong advocate for Hispanic, Native American, and immigrant youth. He is a champion for the underprivileged and has used every opportunity given to him to serve these important minority communities.

Hubert was recently presented a Lifetime Service Award on behalf of his ministry within the Seventh-day Adventist Church. It was noted during



the presentation that through the efforts of his ministry, thousands of children, youth, and young adults have chosen Jesus as their Lord and Savior.

Monterey Bay Academy Alumni Association is honored to recognize Hubert Cisneros for the ministry he has so freely given to the numerous churches, organizations, and conferences across the United States. During his 45 years of service to the Adventist church, Hubert has blessed many people as a pastor, evangelist, youth director, and administrator. Thank you, Hubert, for the countless lives you have influenced for Christ and for your devotion and dedication to selflessly serving others.

Kent Hansen '71 Alumnus of the Year

Kent Hansen came to Monterey Bay Academy in fall of 1969 from Sonora, CA. He spent two years at MBA, graduating with the Class of 1971. Following graduation, he continued his education at La Sierra College when the campus was part of Loma Linda University. He graduated in 1975 with a bachelor of arts degree in history and political science, followed by a juris doctorate degree from Willamette University in 1979.

Leadership and service to others are gifts that God has blessed Kent with. During his years at La Sierra, he was deeply involved in student government and also served as editor of the student newspaper. He continued to use these gifts, following his college graduation, serving as associate dean of students and general counsel for Loma Linda University (1979–1982). He then joined a law firm in Corona, CA, and in 1988, his leadership abilities were recognized and rewarded when he became a named partner of that firm: Clayson, Mann, Yeager & Hansen. Working as their managing attorney, Kent focused on educational law, healthcare law, nonprofit corporate law, and employment defense.

Along with his continued service to his law firm and his role as general counsel for Loma

Linda University, Kent has taught at both La Sierra University and Loma Linda University. He has also continued his love of service by staying actively involved in community service projects. In addition to his role as general counsel, Kent is an assistant professor at the Loma Linda University School of Dentistry, teaching a course in dentistry and the law.


Not long ago, an article was written about Kent and published in the *La Sierra News*. It stated the following: "As general counsel for Loma Linda University Health, Kent Hansen oversees the 30 corporations that comprise LLUH which functions as one of only 125 academic health centers in the United States. Loma Linda University Health employs about 16,000 people and annually educates 4,500 students in the health sciences. Kent is the principal architect of the institution's system of governance and organization."

Kent has maintained his connection with La Sierra University over the year in various ways, including serving as university legal counsel through his law firm. He is quoted as saying, "The realities of racial and gender diversity learned on the La Sierra campus influenced my drafts of the first affirmative action plans for Loma Linda



University and Andrews University, and inspired my personal and professional commitments to fight racial and gender discrimination whenever I've encountered it."

In recognition of all Kent has contributed to Loma Linda and La Sierra University, Kent received an honorary doctor of law (LLD) from La Sierra on June 18, 2017. Such recognition is evidence of Kent's servant heart. Monterey Bay Academy is honored to recognize Kent Hansen for his commitment to excellence, his dedication to higher Adventist education, and his devotion to serving his community.

2020 HALL OF FAITH

Glen and Kathy DeWitt Hall of Faith

It was 1968, one of the most historic years in American history—a year full of social and political changes, as well as historic tragedies and triumphs. It was during this time the Rainbow Fin Company began in Soquel, CA. Glen DeWitt and his wife, Kathy, had recently moved from the East Bay to 37th Avene where he began shaping surfboards for his personal use at their Pleasure Point surf shack. In need of fins, Glen visited the young fin company where original owner, Tom Knight, sold Glen a fin and offered him a job glassing and polishing fins.

Glen accepted the job, and suddenly, life was good for the young couple, earning \$400 a month, making fins and surfing. "It couldn't get any better," Glen recalls. Then in 1970, he became co-owner of Rainbow Fin Company with Tom Knight, and life was the best it had ever been. However, with the fast and furious lifestyle that followed, the company soon took a turn that nearly ended its existence. Between fatherhood, surfing, work, and living a party lifestyle, life began to spin out of control and Glen realized a personal change was desperately needed.

It was decided to close Rainbow Fin and he and Tom moved their families to Angwin, CA, where they both enrolled at Pacific Union College to study theology. While there, they both experienced a real spiritual awakening, but soon realized they could not support their families as full-time students. Praying God would intervene and show them how they could continue their education and pay the bills, a new opportunity came and they started making skateboards.

Their days were spent going to school, and at night, they were glassing, cutting and grinding their new orders for downhill racing skateboards.

One evening, after beginning this new venture, Tom came to Glen and said that God told him they needed to go to Monterey Bay Academy. With the desire to become a chaplain, Glen was not convinced that this was the direction they should go. It was not at all what he had planned, but Glen put out his *fleece* with God and said he wanted an undeniable sign that MBA was where he



belonged. Miraculously, the answer came shortly after that, when he and Tom were on a sales trip in Southern California and they stopped by to see a friend, Art Van Diver, former boy's dean at MBA. During the course of their conversation, not knowing what Tom had said to Glen before their trip, Art told Glen, "You need to go to Monterey Bay Academy and see the principal, Elder Harvey Voth, and reopen Rainbow Fin." Glen got his undeniable answer. They would go to MBA.

Arriving on campus in 1975, Elder Voth welcomed them with open arms and showed them the building the business would be in. They were told anything they needed for operating would be set up for them. There was only one stipulation—they had to hire students to work in the business. With that stipulation, Glen's direction in ministry was laid out before him—the ministry of mentoring teenagers for Christ. Eventually, Glen and Kathy took over sole ownership of the company when Tom chose to pursue a career in the medical field in Southern California.

Glen and Kathy's interaction with students continued to grow throughout their years at MBA. Rainbow Fin provided them with an avenue to train and mentor students, helping them to develop work habits and skills that would be beneficial to them throughout their life. Glen's desire to bring kids into a closer relationship with Christ also continued to grow. In 1999, he developed a Sabbath School program called *Set 'n Stone*. It was a student driven program–planned, prepared, and implemented by the students. "My goal with the ministry of *Set 'n Stone*," says Glen, "was to put the cookies on the bottom shelf. In other words, I wanted the truth of the unconditional love of Jesus, His grace and mercy, to be easily grasped and understood by all who became involved in this program." For 12 years, *Set 'n Stone* provided MBA with a ministry that reached students in a way no other program had. It combined art, music, outreach, evangelism, Bible study, and the spoken Word in an effort to present the gospel of Jesus Christ in simple and easy to understand concepts to students with searching hearts.

Along with running the Rainbow Fin business and mentoring high school teenagers in the work force, Kathy's spiritual ministry on campus grew as well. For over 30 years, she ministered to the younger children on campus, leading out in the primary Sabbath School division for the MBA church.

The impact Glen and Kathy DeWitt have had on the campus of Monterey Bay Academy over the last 45 years is immeasurable. The skills and work ethic they developed and nurtured in students is priceless, and the lives they influenced for Christ is countless. They lived out of their car...


THEN...2010

Monterey Bay Academy was encouraged to accept Aaron's^{*} application by his hometown church members. Those folks were hoping for a solid chance at life for Aaron and viewed MBA as that opportunity.

What I saw on the surface when blonde, blue-eyed Aaron arrived on the MBA campus was a good-looking guy with a timid smile. What I later came to know about him goes much deeper than that. The person that arrived here and then graduated two years later were seemingly different people. The Aaron that arrived at MBA was not particularly motivated in class and aimlessly going through the motions of life. As I came to understand, he didn't think there was much to strive for in life. His father had spent years in and out of jail, his mother did the best she could raising Aaron and his younger siblings. She worked. However, there were times that the family lived out of their car because she couldn't pay rent.



There was no overnight magic. However, slowly Aaron began to understand what it meant to be a real man. "Watching my deans and teachers, I observed how Christian men behave and the values they embrace," says Aaron. He began to discover that he could go on with his education and select any career he desired through the mentoring and encouragement of his teachers. Aaron's grades began turning into As and Bs. His girl-



friend was the daughter of a faculty member. Interaction with that family and other families on campus unveiled to him what a Christian home and family could really look like.

Aaron has a big heart and compassion for those in circumstances he has experienced. He became involved in campus ministry projects with Pastor "PJ" Deming, such as feeding the homeless.

His senior year (2012) he received The Class of 1979 Scholarship and The Erik Wolfe Scholarship in recognition of his perseverance and tenacity in grasping opportunities given to him. The evening of the Scholarship Banquet, I saw for the first time that timid smile turn into an ear-to-ear grin. It's forever imbedded in my mind. He suddenly connected to the fact he was valued and his achievements mattered.

At graduation six weeks later, he made the decision to forego a gift and party from his mother and take that money to put towards getting his Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) certification that summer. This way, he could earn money by serving as an EMT while attending college. He's totally on his own in furthering his education.

Two months later, I saw Aaron. He was taking classes at a local community college. He joined the military reserves as another resource to help fund his education. "It's so hard sometimes," he said to me. "So hard to make it work." I was thankful for that opportunity to talk to him. I expressed my confidence in him—in his perseverance—to keep going.

I believe in Aaron because I have seen for myself the transformation of a young teenage boy who thought the "good life" was for other people—not him—to an adult who latched on to the solid hope that was laid out before him at MBA. He'll make it.

Aaron married that MBA faculty member's daughter years later after she completed her college education and became an elementary school teacher. He has a great job. This couple is busy raising their daughter and expecting another daughter very soon. Although life is still difficult at times, as it is for anyone, Aaron has discovered the "good life" for himself.

At what point would Aaron have realized the characteristics of a Godly man or a glimpse of solid, Christ-centered families?

Creating Safety for the Present and the Future

Our report a year ago included the \$1.7 million in reductions to the budget due to a COVID-19 pandemic-related decrease in enrollment while we maintained online distance learning for our students. Santa Cruz County permitted MBA to reopen in January 2021 and bring students on-campus once again. Here are the vital facts from the past year.

HAS THE ENROLLMENT RECOVERED SINCE COVID-19 SHUT DOWN IN-PERSON ATTENDANCE?

We had 211 students when the COVID-19 pandemic shut down the campus and students were sent home in the spring of 2020. Upon reopening, 134 students made their way back to campus with either in-person learning or a few choosing to study online at their homes. We are trending upward this current school year with 168 in-person students. The online learning option is no longer available due to our reduction in faculty to accommodate the lower enrollment. Simply stated, the continuing momentum in regaining our student population equates to the ability to hire more teachers as we move forward.

State of the School

WHY? BECAUSE WE CONSIDER YOU VALUED FAMILY AND INVESTORS TO OUR MISSION AND OUR VISION. HOW MUCH IN DONATIONS CAME IN A YEAR AGO TO COVER THE UNEX-PECTED EXPENSES OF THE BEACH AUDITORIUM FIRE AND THE POTEN-TIAL \$168,000 BUDGET DEFICIT BY JUNE 30, 2021?

Thanks to your generous blessings we more than covered those expenses to the amount of \$207,034 and did not have to borrow any funds from the Central California Conference. We ended the school year debt-free, maintaining our end goal of *stewardship*.

IS THE 2021–2022 OPERATING BUDGET FARING BETTER THAN LAST YEAR?

Yes! Barring unexpected fires! In fact, we conservatively budgeted for 140 students this school year, so that places us +28 students. It is a tight budget, and our faculty and staff have taken on extra duties so that we may remain financially healthy during this COVID-19 recovery period. We thank them abundantly for their extraordinary efforts!

ARE YOU WORKING ON ANY CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS TO THE CAMPUS?

Yes. Pages 12–13 provide a complete update on the Grunke Hall carpet installation, as well as both dorms receiving exterior paint in the past year thanks to your generous gifts. If you've been on campus in the past year, no doubt you noticed the new pavement and construction on some of our roads. We will be announcing more about this nearly completed campaign soon! Get a sneak peek on page 9.

Lastly, we praise God for His watchful care over our MBA family during these unpredictable times. That includes YOU—our dedicated alumni and friends. We are so thankful and continue to be greatly blessed by you despite the challenges COVID-19 unexpectedly brought to us!

Tuberculosis (TB)...we don't hear much about it these days. The news is all about COVID-19. Yet, TB has killed more people than any other infectious disease in world-wide history.

In the 1940s, when Gene (*ficticious name*) was a young boy, standard treatment for those infected with tuberculosis was to send them away to a sanitarium. Both of Gene's parents were sent away when he was only 12 years old. He had older siblings that tried to take care of him, but eventually the Adventist church members led him to enroll at MBA for his sophomore year.

In those days, Gene could work each day/week to help pay his school bill. He stayed and worked the summers as well.

"MBA was home to me. I didn't really have anywhere else to go," says Gene. The faculty, staff, and students became his family for the three years he lived there.

Gene attributes his deans, especially, in providing security and guidance in his life. So much so, that he graduated from MBA thinking that becoming a dean was the career route he would take. Gene also credits his MBA teachers for instilling the ideal that he could choose any career he wanted. Seven years following his college graduation, he took the bold step of entering dental school. He's been a dentist ever since.

"My wife and I go to мвА at least once a year. It still feels like going home."

The INTANGIBLES are these aspects that are the fiber of MBA for which you'll never see in a promotional video or a marketing ad. I believe you share along with me in the value of a child's basic needs (i.e., a safe place to lay their heads at night or to feel valued and loved).


VOLUNTEERS

WASHINGTON, DC HISTORY TOUR

uring the first homeleave of the school year, 47 students and nine sponsors traveled to the heart of American politics and history. The adventure began in Virginia, then on to Pennsylvania and Amish Country, and finished in Washington, DC.

"The whole point of doing a history trip," says Tim Zytkoskee, MBA history teacher and leader of the tour, "is to give our students the opportunity to experience American history first-hand, not just read about it in a textbook. Being able to actually stand in places where historical events took place is an awesome and rewarding experience."

Student, Jesse Follett '22, said, "I really enjoyed the history trip because it made the things we have studied in US History and Government classes come alive. It is a trip I would do again and would recommend students to go on if they ever have the opportunity." Jesse went on to say how much he appreciated all the work that went into making the trip fun and exciting for the students.

Some of the historical places visited included Harpers Ferry, Gettysburg, Mount Vernon, Fort McHenry, Arlington National Cemetery and of course, all the monuments in Washington, DC. The group visited the Lincoln Memorial, Washington Monument, Vietnam Veterans Memorial, Martin Luther King, Jr Memorial, and the Franklin D. Roosevelt Memorial. Museums were also part of the tour and included the Holocaust Museum and several of the Smithsonian museums.

Mr. Zytkoskee hopes that the history tour will help students understand that America is both an idea and a place, and that they will have a better appreciation for our country. More importantly, he hopes the students see that our past is very much a part of who we are today as a nation.

The history trip occurs every two years at the cost of \$1,500, a price that has not increased for the last five years. By planning a history tour every two years, students and parents have time to raise funds for the trip. The next history tour is in 2022—traveling to Boston and New York.

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"BLUE SKIES" OVER MBA

The Exploring Aviation and Ground School Program at MBA continues to challenge and inspire the next generation of aviators. We all know the skies are not always blue over MBA as we have our cherished blanket of seacoast fog more often than not. However, with the growing cadre of student aviators and aerospace development forums on campus, it is now not uncommon at the end of a class or field session to hear the familiar aviator's goodbye of "Blue Skies" cheerfully hailed to one another even though the fog is so thick you can't see the end of the runway.

Learning

This year's class has nine students, representing Brazil, Germany, Spain, and the US. The class meets twice weekly, either in the classroom discussing and reviewing technical lessons, or at the MBA airfield (CA66) where guest pilots, like Ken Locke-Padden with his KitFox plane or Jeremy Lezin and his Carbon Cub plane, provide hands on discussion of plane systems, flight dynamics, and safety review. Guest pilots also provide demonstrations in takeoff and landing procedures so that students can see the various techniques they will need to learn along the path to earning a pilot license.

GLEIM UNIVERSITY Classroom work is based on the Gleim University coursework, including the Private Pilot Handbook, Private Pilot Test Prep system, and Remote Pilot Test Prep. At course completion, students should be able to pass the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) written exam for both Private Pilot and Remote Pilot Ground School certificates and the Remote Pilot license.

Book and computer learning, classroom discussion, and on-site airplane demonstrations are strengthened by a state-of-the-art, interactive Gleim University flight simulator, thanks to the generous donation of the **Tom Seibly '57** family. This teaching instrument allows students to pre-fly and postfly their "in-the-plane" flight lessons, which

can significantly reduce the cost of earning a pilot license, as students rapidly become more proficient with the hands on and spatial skills needed for competent, safe flight. It also reinforces the classroom learning of the non-flying aviation students. Currently, three students are taking flying lessons at nearby Watsonville Airport (KWVI).

CAMPUS INDUSTRIES The term "aviator" includes both manned and unmanned autonomous systems (UAS) and MBA is a dynamic incubator for students interested in either of those career tracks via the on-campus industries of AirSpace Integration, Parallel Flight, and Calfee Design. The cutting-edge science and technology being developed by these businesses provides opportunities for students to engage in the disciplines at these research facilities. The intellectual and handson development of technology and experimentation has led to these companies being involved with projects at SpaceX and Mojave Air and Space Port. Students are blessed to have these resources as presentations in the classroom.



FIELD TRIPS Students will be visiting two renowned aviation museums, Hiller Aviation Museum and the Wings of History Air

Museum. Both venues have interactive displays, static displays of historical planes, and the step-by-step advancement of aerospace and aviation technology.

D.A.R.T. The aviation students, along with the physics and physical science classes, had the opportunity to attend the on-site portion of the Drone Automation Robotics and Technologies (DART) symposium that was held on campus in late October.

AIRPLANE BUILD Students are also welcomed to join Arthur Siordia (aeronautical engineer), Chris Bley (CEO of AirSpace Integration and cofounder of DART), and Jay Ketelsen '76 as they collaborate to complete construction of a Zenith STOL CH701 kit plane. This is a great opportunity for students to really learn how everything "works." SS
