# EDITOR'S MESSAGE



## I Knew I Belonged

have contemplated what it means to "belong" throughout different times in my life. These thoughts of "belonging" started during my early childhood and have continued into my adult years as I have journeyed through various life events. Here's my definition of what it means to belong: Belonging is feeling that you are safe, accepted, welcomed, and loved. It is a quality that can be developed over time and be shared with others. To know that we belong is one of the greatest victories of our existence.

When I was a child, my family occasionally traveled for family reunions to Wooster, OH, where my paternal grandparents lived. With the last name of Yoder, it's hard to mistake that my paternal ancestry is German. The Yoder family was large: six children, with my father being the eldest. As you can imagine, family reunions brought together a good-sized group of people. Before I continue, you must know that my grandfather was a huge jokester and tease, had an incredible sense of humor, and an unforgettable laugh. One evening, following one of these reunion meals, I was standing beside my grandfather as he sat at the dining room table. He turned, looked at me, and said, "Skinny Mae (his nickname for me, because I was rail thin), I think your parents must have picked up the wrong baby at the hospital when you were born. You don't look like the rest of us!" He then threw his

head back and laughed that unforgettable laugh—only to quickly add, "You know I'm just teasing. You definitely belong to us."

Why tease me? Out of his 15 grandchildren, I was the only one with an olive complexion, dark brown hair, and very dark brown eyes—all courtesy of my mother's genes. Of course, those features don't resemble the most common physical characteristics for a person of German descent—light complexions (that are prone to sunburn), light brown or blond hair, and blue or green eyes.

You might understandably think, "What an awful thing to say!" I must emphasize that I knew my grandfather was teasing. More importantly, I knew I absolutely belonged to the Yoder family. Why? Because I knew I was safe, accepted, welcomed, and loved unconditionally—by my parents, by my grandfather, and by the rest of my extended family.

Our theme for this school year is, *You Belong.* It is our mission, as a faculty and staff, to make each student feel they belong—not just here at MBA, but to the family of God. *You were bought at a price*, I CORINTHIANS 6:20 NIV. God rescued us. He accepts us just as we are. He welcomes us with open arms, and loves us unconditionally because of the price paid at Calvary. We belong to Him alone!

## **TRIALS MAKE PURE GOLD**

## The Making and Molding of the Chuck Fulmore Trio

huck '55 and Dona (Bentz) '54 Fulmore never set out to be—or even imagined it possible to become—musical evangelists. In fact, the more likely scenario for both of them was to follow in their parents' footsteps and become dairy farmers—Dona north of Seattle, Washington; Chuck near Modesto, California.

"Mother worked very hard in the house," Dona recalls. "There were five of us girls and then the dozen or so hired men who came to help at harvest time who she also cooked for. She was a gentle, lovely lady.

In addition to farming, Chuck's father "drove truck" during fruit harvest season. "He got a dollar a day doing that," Chuck says. "It gave him a little cash to put in his pocket."

Despite the demands of farm life, music played an important role in both Chuck's and Dona's growing-up years. When she was little, Dona's parents often sang together for evangelistic series at the local church, and when they got older, she and her sisters sang harmony together while their mother played piano. Chuck's mother, too, played piano and sang, and his father played trumpet. "They often did special music together," Chuck says, adding that one of the highlights of his childhood was when his whole family pitched in to help prepare the church for an evangelistic series for which his parents provided music.

Church and a firm belief in God were central to both families' lives, and that meant a Christian education too. As there was no church school nearby, Dona's father remodeled a section of the family's home to serve as a classroom where she, her sisters, the neighbor kids, and children of the hired hands had school.

"The conference sent teachers to give us our lessons there," Dona remembers. Then she adds with a laugh, "After a while, though, they wouldn't send us any more, as the teachers kept marrying the hired hands and leaving!"

## **A Special Friendship**

The two met at Monterey Bay Academy in California. How Chuck came to be there is quite a fascinating and heartwarming story, outlined in the Fulmores' recent storiesbehind-the-songs book, *Never Give Up.* In



this book Chuck also tells the very important story of when he noticed a particular girl in front of him in choir.

"I was impressed with her lovely, long hair," he says. The story continues with Chuck later looking for someone to type an essay for him. The second name on the list the typing teacher gives him is Dona Bentz. When he goes to find her with his request, he discovers Dona is the choir girl with the beautiful hair. "Oh, boy, I should be so lucky!" Chuck writes in the book.

Dona agreed to type his essay for him, but it came at a cost: He was to pay the \$1 entry fee for her to attend an upcoming dinner with him. He happily agreed, and, as he concludes in the book, "That was the beginning of a special friendship".

They were married soon after high school, and of course music remained an integral part of their home and church life. Dona taught Chuck how to harmonize, and they have continued making music together for many, many years.


"We've been together for 68 years—through thick and thin," says Dona with a smile. "Recently Chuck gave me a card on which he had written, 'They said all we had was puppy love, but this old dog still loves you.' I thought that was cute!"

## "God Could Have Given Up On Me"


Chuck is a third generation Adventist on both sides of his family. As he grew up saying his nightly prayers, attending family worships, blessing each meal, and going to church every Sabbath, the salvation he learned was earned only through works.

"My grandmother once told me I wasn't going to make it into God's 'good' book, and she meant it," Chuck recalls. "I figured I was just born bad. Life was a real battle for me, and I couldn't live up to the standards that were expected of me. I reached a point where I just got really discouraged."

He got so discouraged he stopped attending church. As he recalls this period of

their life in the book, Chuck points out this didn't mean they no longer believed in God; they still prayed, still enjoyed family worship, and still regularly sang their favorite gospel songs together.

"A friend I worked with, who also attended church, gave me the idea to start every day by reading my Bible and having prayer," Chuck explains. Though it did become a habit, he says at first he was just reading words and not applying much meaning to them. "Every once in a while, though," he admits, "something would click."

One of those "somethings" was John 12:32, which says, "And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto me" (KJV). Though Chuck knew Christ was referring to hanging on the cross, what hit him was the second part.

*"He'll* do the drawing and converting," Chuck expounds. And in the book, he adds, "What I have discovered in my personal journey after all these years [is that] God is the One who changes us...He leads us to find God. He gives us the understanding. He gives us the desire to know more. He does the miraculous things that happen along the way. And they *are* miracles".

Quietly over the phone, Chuck says, "I often look back over my life and see all the times God could have given up on me...but didn't."

## "It's the Darkest Just before Dawn"

Thanks to the patient nudges and gracefilled love of the people around them, Chuck eventually returned to church. Once he was back, he and his family, who never stopped attending, unsurprisingly became deeply involved in music.

"We sang wherever we lived," Dona says. "We did duets, and sometimes Chuck sang solos. We did church services, camp meetings, and evangelistic meetings, and as soon as the kids were old enough to join us, they did."

Chuck found himself regularly inspired with tunes and lyrics—usually around 3 a.m.

"I'd wake up and hear the piano in the early hours of the morning, and I'd smile to myself," Dona recalls. "I knew that by the time I got up to make breakfast the next morning, we'd have a new song to learn."

One of the most poignant facts about the music Chuck has written is that it was most often inspired by difficult situations. Many of these challengescertainly the bigger onesare detailed in their book, and perhaps the most heartbreaking of them all was the loss of their oldest daughter, Dianne, to leukemia at age 13.

"Dona and I...both [had] a difficult time adjusting to our unbelievable loss," Chuck writes. "The weeks and months following the funeral were so extremely difficult! And then the Lord brought us courage through the following chorus:

"Never give up; Jesus is coming. It's the darkest just before dawn.

"Never give up; Jesus is coming. Never give up; keep holding on" Dona adds that someone recently mentioned the hardest thing about being a Christian is never giving up, which may explain why their song, "Never give up," struck a chord with so many.

"I'd never thought of that before," Dona says, "and they're right; it is hard. But if we hang in there and keep trusting Him, leaning on Him, and holding on, He will see us through."

## "Don't Talk Religion!"

Though their quartet was now a trio, The Fulmore's faith did not lessen. They still got off work in the evening, drove dozens of miles to sing, and then drove home to do it all again the next day, filling their weekends with church music and events.

The time and effort didn't faze them, however. Their passion for honoring God through song only grew, and soon they were taking their ministry on the road, singing for camp meetings and evangelistic series across the country. Dona did all the public relations and marketing for their scheduled performances, and when they arrived, they stayed in church members' homes.

"We met so many wonderful people

throughout the years by staying in homes," Chuck shares. "That was really special to us."

But touring from Boston to Los Angeles, Seattle to Miami, and many cities in-between didn't exactly pay the bills.

"We never really made a living with our music," Dona admits. "Freewill offerings and record sales helped, but what kept us afloat were our day jobs."

It always seemed that regardless of what they needed, God found a way to provide—sometimes in the strangest ways.

"Allow me to paint you a picture," Chuck says, amusement in his voice. "A Volkswagen beetle, one giant speaker strapped to the top, the other tied to the back bumper with rope, Dona and me trundling down the highway inside it. That was our first sound system!"

A friend who did a lot of gospel music in another church helped them track down pieces to create a makeshift sound system, and they used it for years. When they needed a pianist who could accompany them by ear, God must have been chuckling when he solved that problem.

"The accompanist we found was an atheist," Chuck explains. "The three of us, plus Dianne and Carla, would get in that vw on Sabbath morning, and he would always say, 'I'll go as long as you don't talk religion!' But sometimes, he asked us religion questions as we drove. It was an interesting experience."

## "Look Up, Hold On, and Never Give Up"

Over the years, The Fulmore Trio, consisting of Dona, Chuck, and their daughter, Carla Dawn, recorded 10 albums and released six songbooks. Their songs have been recorded by well-known singers such as Del Delker, The King's Heralds (now The Heralds), and the Heritage Singers. It was truly an amazing feat for musicians who lived off their day jobs and had never learned to read music or put music down on paper.

The Fulmores built a close relationship with the Heritage Singers, as Dona had attended school with Max Mace and his cousin, Gary Andregg, and Chuck wrote many of their songs too. When Max started his own record company, Chuck and Dona worked for him. Their reach grew because of these connections, and their music has traveled around the world and across generations.

"We never sang for recognition at all," Chuck comments. "We always sang to encourage souls."

Dona agrees.

"Obviously the Lord has brought us a long way, and has helped us immensely over the broken spots and rough patches," she says. "The bottom line is that we love the Lord and we want to influence other people to look to Him for strength, hope, and answers in life."

Their book, *Never Give Up*, was written for the same purpose: To encourage and uplift "some discouraged, struggling soul...needing help along the way. To help that person to look up, hold on, and *never give up*".


## "He's Changed Us"

At times the Fulmore story sounds like a modern-day Job story—the death of a child, recurring illness, loss of livelihood, unexpected financial hardship, obstacles at every turn. Listening to Chuck and Dona talk and reading their book simply solidifies that idea, as their faith, despite everything they've encountered in their lives, remains stronger than ever.

"Trusting God to do what he wants to do with our lives has been a big thing for us," she says. "He's changed us—many times over. We're just glad he's let us live this long, so we can get to know him better and better."

Though Chuck and Dona admit their singing days are over, they still very much enjoy music in church, the fellowship of their church community in Boise, Idaho, and spending time with God. They look forward to the day Christ comes again and they are able to once again make music as a family quartet. In fact, Chuck already has plans.

"The music in heaven will be fabulous—truly out of this world," he says with a grin. "If there's a recording studio in heaven, that's where I'm going to be.

In 1966, Bob and Danetta Johnson were married. They were blessed with daughter, Wendy, in 1970, and son, Rob in 1972. **Rob** is an alum of MBA, and graduated in 1990.

In the summer of 1973, Bob was asked to serve as treasurer of the Japan Union Mission of SDA on an interim basis. Bob ended up serving there for the next nine years. 



Lisa also worked when they arrived in 1989, but not on campus. From 1989–1991 she worked for Food and Nutrition Services in Capitola. In 1994, she was hired as a cafeteria worker when Versatron managed boarding academy food service programs. It wasn't until 1997, when MBA decided to run its own food service that Lisa become the Food Service Director, a position she held for 24 years until she retired last June. Her talent and skill in the food service industry is outstanding.

From the moment David and Lisa arrived on the MBA campus they were a "kid magnet." Their home was regularly filled with not just high school students, but neighborhood faculty children, as well. They had two young elementary-aged daughters and it wasn't long before all the faculty kids on campus figured out that "Mama Lisa," as she is affectionately known as to hundreds of students, was a fabulous cook and there was always good home-cooked food available. The Lara's never seemed to mind how many students filled their home. It was always, "the more the merrier." I can remember walking outside my home and smelling the aroma of food cooking in the air. I would comment to my husband, "I think the Lara's are having a BBQ. Should we run up and see what Lisa's cooking?" And when we showed up-uninvited by the way-we were always wel-

comed with open arms, and this went for students as well.

Here's a small example of how you knew the love the campus kids and MBA students had for the Lara's and the love the Lara's had for the kids. You know how every home has a door jam in the house with little tick marks up the side with names and dates after the markings, keeping track of the growth of the children in the family? Well, their door jam was just like that. But it didn't just have their children's growth progress marked, it had campus kids and high school kids on the door jam. There were so many tick marks and so many names, there was very little blank space left. I believe that's a sign of love. It's a sign of family. David and Lisa became family to many kids down through the years.

As I was preparing my remarks for this award, I asked the Lara's if I could stop by their house and chat about the past 34 years. As we talked, I realized the magnitude of what these two individuals have provided MBA with over the years.

- In the early years of MBA's existence, all the maintenance staff were required to get a bus license. David drove for class trips, music trips, varsity trips, field trips, mission trips, and much more.
- In 1990, David became responsible for planning the Mission Trips and that continued for nine straight years
- In 1991, David and Lisa began a 12-year, nonstop stretch of sponsoring classes. They sponsored 1991, 1996, 2000, 2004, 2011, and 2014.
- In 2003, David and Lisa took over Senior Survival, with the Class of 2023 culminating their tenure.
- In 2005, former industrial arts teacher, Rick Regester, started the First Reponder class—still currently taught. Rick needed a co-teacher and David obliged.
- In 2006, David took over teaching the First Responder course and has continued teaching it for the past 18 years.
- Somewhere along the way, they found time to coach the girls' basketball team.





Did I mention that this is all on top of his maintenance job?

 Lisa's job, as Food service director, included preparing food for five banquets per year, along with many other school functions. David was right by her side, helping her basically move the cafeteria to various locations when the event was held somewhere other than the cafe

After we had reminisced for a while, my heart became sad when I realized the hole that will be left when the Lara's are no long on campus. For me personally, it is hard to imagine MBA without them here because they are not just friends, they are family. I don't know about you, but I'm tired of saying goodbye to people I love and care for deeply. I long for heaven where there are no goodbyes.

As David and Lisa look forward to their soon retirement, MBA wishes them only the best that life can offer. It is my privilege and honor to induct them into the Hall of Faith. We are forever grateful for their talent and skills that have touched the lives of others during their 34 years of dedication and commitment to MBA.


looking for a history teacher. However, the last date to apply for the position and request an interview was the day before, on Friday. He was one day late.

Ruthi will continue to volunteer in the operations department and you will find Tim riding a lawn mower and teaching one class: AP History.

## FROM THE PRINCIPAL



## You Belong

t's an interesting study in human nature to realize God has created within each one of us—introverts and extroverts, the loquacious and those of few words, the bold and the meek alike—the desire to be in a community of some sort; the innate desire to know that, with all of our faults and foibles, there is some group of people that is still willing to take us in as one of them. We all hope to find some collection of individuals with whom we share a similar worldview, habits of mind, and traits of character.

At the beginning of each new school year, students arrive on the MBA campus from places near and far, many returning to a school and experience with which they are already familiar, but a surprisingly large number that is coming to MBA for the first time. Yet each new school year possesses elements of the unknown, and so every student arrives with questions waiting to be answered, doubts and misgivings waiting to be quelled, and hopes and expectations waiting to be realized. Seasoning this stew of thoughts, ideas, and emotions is a deep need for belonging.

Young, still-developing minds often feel this need for belonging much more keenly than some of us more seasoned life travelers. So, it is imperative that we as a school community create an environment where students from many different cultures and contexts can quickly find as many ways as possible to "fit in." For this year's theme, the faculty and staff have chosen *You Belong*, and based it on Paul's letter to the Ephesians in which he also was trying to help them feel a sense of community around their newfound belief in Jesus Christ. In the pivotal verse Paul tells them, *You are no longer outsiders and strangers...you are citizens together with God's people...you are members of God's family*. EPHESIANS 2:19 NIRV

We count it a special privilege to be God's instruments in helping this important Bible promise become a reality for our students. Nothing we do this year will be as important as helping young people to recognize and accept their place in God's family. To be sure, the knowledge and skills our students will attain this year are important, but it's only through the realization of our worth in the eyes of God that any skills and abilities He has blessed us with have meaning.

Let me share one example from last school year: Mikela came to MBA as a senior from Poland with an interest in aviation. She enrolled in our Aviation Ground School, not because she was interested in learning how to fly, but because she wanted to understand every aspect of the aviation industry in preparation for a career as an aviation executive. The fact that this aviation experience was available within a Christian high school context proved to be mildly irritating for Mikela sometimes, and at other times a much bigger annoyance. Early in the year, she paid the principal's office several visits to express her frustrations with the many religious services she was required to attend. As the year progressed, however, something seemed to change. Mikela's attitude toward these expectations seemed to soften. She started to ask more questions and take more interest in her Basic Christianity class. While some of the changes were noticeable, it didn't seem to most of us that the needle had moved very much. As a staff, our prayer was that we might simply plant a seed and maybe someday we would hear that she had given her life to Jesus.

Fast forward to the end of the school year. Our campus pastor had been studying the Bible with another senior, Camila, who expressed a desire to be baptized on gradu-

ation weekend. Just after the baccalaureate service ended and people began to gather around the outdoor baptistry to watch Camila commit her life to Jesus, the totally unexpected occurred. Mikela stepped to the side of the baptistry and asked the pastor if she too could be baptized...not later...now. While we had all been praying that the Holy Spirit might do something in the future, He had other plans. Because Mikela responded to the Holy Spirit's gentle urgings, the pastor wasn't afraid to go off script a little bit and the family of God grew that day. Mikela's decision to become a part of God's family happened because she experienced a sense of belonging.

As a faculty and staff, we believe that the Holy Spirit will move in the lives of our students if we will place ourselves daily in Gods' hands. We know that there are others who will come to recognize that they ... are no longer outsiders and strangers... but they are actually ... citizens together with God's people... and are truly ... members of God's family. This is our prayer for our students and our prayer for each one of you, our MBA alumni and supporters.

ducation is more than sitting in a classroom and learning information from a textbook. Learning includes taking field trips, serving on mission trips, performing on music tours, participating in sports, and when given the opportunity, traveling to other countries. Each year, MBA plans either a domestic or international educational tour for students to enhance their academic experience. This school year, an educational tour to Austria, Germany, and Switzerland is scheduled from March 16-26, 2024 (exact dates to be determined). This tour is organized through EF Educational Tours. The group will depart from San Francisco International airport for Vienna, Austria, where the experience will begin.

This tour was last taken by MBA students in 2018 and it was an unforgettable experience for them. The sights seen and places visited immersed the students in the culture, language, people, food, and way of life. We are excited to be able to offer this opportunity to our students once again.

## Austria

Vienna is first on the list, visiting the Ringstraße (The Ring Road), Parliament building, and Schönbrunn Palace (the childhood home of Marie Antoinette). After a brief pause in Salzburg (birthplace of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart and the setting for the film *The Sound*  *of Music*), the tour moves to Germany, with Munich as the next destination.

#### Germany

The Olympiastadion (Olympic Stadium), Marienplatz (Mary's Square) central square with the Rathaus-Glockenspiel mechanical clock at the Neues Rathaus (New Town Hall), Frauenkirche (Munich Cathedral), and Dachau (one of the first World War II Nazi concentration camps). Exiting Munich, the tour will visit Neuschwanstein Castle before stops Tyrol and the microstate of Liechtenstein before continuing to the Lucerne region of Switzerland to view the majestic Swiss Alps.

#### Switzerland

Swiss sites will include the Löwendenkmal (Lion Monument), Kapellbrücke (Chapel Bridge), and Lake Lucerne. Before reaching Frankfurt, Germany, to board a plane and return home, students will visit Heidelberger Schloss (Heidelberg Castle).

When this amazing travel opportunity is over and the students arrive back at MBA, they will realize the benefits of this lifechanging experience are not over, but rather they have just begun.

Last year, following the invasion of Ukraine, Pastor Violeta "Violet" Bilan, associate pastor of the Living Word Adventist Church in Oregon City, OR, received requests from Ukrainians—parents reaching out to get their children to America for safety. Everything these families owned was confiscated, leaving them with no money. Regardless, MBA said yes to four students.

All four students have returned to us again after a very successful first year. They are kind, dedicated, and enthusiastic kids who have become fully engaged in life at MBA. One serves as principal accompanist to the Oceanaires and another has been elected as SA Executive Vice President/Student Senate President. These incredible students have

added so much to the MBA family.

The tuition cost for an Adventist international student is \$20,000. Our goal was to raise \$80,000 for these four students for the 2022–2023 school year—*and we did it*. Last year, a donor gave each of these students \$1,000 each at Christmas, to purchase gifts for their families and to help with holiday travel expenses. Sasha chose to give his funds to his grandmother to help her rebuild her home.

# **MBA NEEDS YOUR HELP. YES, YOU!**

S ince 2006, much has been done in the way of improvements to classrooms, dormitories, the cafeteria, and faculty homes. However, in the past 50 years, very little has been done to improve the facilities and commercial industrial buildings. As has been documented in past issues of *Sandscripts*, the past two years has shown a flurry of improvements in these often overlooked, but absolutely critical areas of our home on the shore.

The various campus shops and commercial industry buildings make it possible to execute the day-to-day and long-term mission of MBA. Shops are full of tooling and materials to keep things running all over campus. Industry buildings provide space where companies successfully conduct their business and allow for employment of MBA students, collaborate with the school's curriculum as learning labs, and to provide income through building space leasing.

The east end of the grounds building and the construction of a vital concrete bridge were completed two years ago—all that work was made possible by the generosity and kindness of John Solomon '61. Thank you!

Last school year, the roof, exterior siding, and windows were replaced on the main physical plant building, topped off with a paint job. This building is the maintenance headquarters with offices, conference room, several shops (carpentery, electrical, locksmith, and paint), and a vast inventory of plumbing, lumber, and electrical materials.

We were also able to paint the grounds building, motor pool, bus barn, and the mechanical garage. The new paint scheme on these buildings is a theme that will be carried through all our facilities and industrial areas. These buildings look great now—but, they need new roofs!

## Volunteer Project: Spring 2024

The current goal is to complete the painting of all the industry buildings that run parallel to the cut to the beach (Lakeside Way). Completing these painting jobs and installing new roofs is a major undertaking that desperately needs funds and volunteers. The overall estimate is \$160,000, which includes materials (\$130,000), as well as equipment rental, and food and lodging for volunteers (\$30,000).

It is critical to replace the roof on the garage building before winter arrives. The remaining roofs and painting projects are planned to be completed in the spring with a 10-day volunteer effort.

Are up to some hard work, like to paint, or can help with the roofing? Lodging and meals will be provided by MBA.

Two weeks *before* Alumni Weekend 2024 is the planned date range—but is not firmly set.
